Batak script has been used to write the Batak languages on Sumatra: Batak [Toba] /bbc/, Karo /btx/, Mandailing /btm/, Pakpak or Dairi /btd/ and Simalungun /bts/. Nowadays these languages are mainly written in Roman alphabet; Batak script is used for ornamental purposes. Batak script in the languages have several variations in glyphs, also their alphabetic sequence varies; the table below has been adapted from the Unicode standard..

Notes

- 1. Syllable-final -h and -ng (Table II No. 7 and 8) are usually positioned on vowel characters, e.g. $-\tilde{\circ} \rightarrow ping$, $-\tilde{\star} \rightarrow pong$, $-\tilde{\star} \rightarrow peh$, $-\tilde{\dot{\circ}} \rightarrow pih$.
- 2. In a closed syllable, ending with a consonant and containing the end-of-syllable character, the vowel diacritics are reordered to the position after the syllable-final consonant and before the end-of-syllable character, e.g. $\times \times \to tep$, $\times \times \to tip$, $\times \times \to top$.
